

In 2011, your Society will continue to work diligently on your behalf with the following activities and focus:

- ·Legislative A seat at the legislative table with upcoming debates and decisions including, protecting physicians from any proposed state provider tax, ensuring that pre-certified/preauthorized treatment is reimbursed and mandating truth in advertising for allied healthcare. We will continue to safeguard the practice of medicine and assist the Society's members with presentations at public hearings, bill tracking and meetings with key legislators.
- Worker's Compensation Continue an open dialogue with the Commission and key legislators to discuss a possible update of current treatment guidelines and health care coverage for the injured workers of Connecticut.
- <u>Programs for Your Practice</u> Educational seminars are offered at reduced rates with continuing education credits. Don't miss the <u>Coding Workshop</u> scheduled for **March 10, 2011** (registration form in this issue) Don't miss the <u>Communications Workshops</u> which provides CMIC-insured members with a 2.5% premium credit and CME credits.
- Annual Meeting & CMEs This year's event will be held on May 13, 2011, at the Farmington Marriott Hotel and will offer informative clinical sessions from renowned speakers and more.

2011 Legislative Session

The session begins January 5, 2011, and the Society is ready to embark on a renewed attempt to obtain legislation that would guarantee payment of precertified/preauthorized services and procedures. Spearheaded last session by Drs. F. Scott Gray and Frank Gerratana, language was introduced to achieve this goal however in the final hours our support was withdrawn due to significant language changes made by the insurance industry. Our Society will need members and their patients to lend specific problems and experiences they have had with retroactive denial of previously precertified and/or preauthorized procedures.

We will be working with the State Medical Society and Specialty Societies on Truth in Advertising, Medical Loss Ratio Caps, Definition of Surgery, Enhancing Standards and Fairness in Contracting and opposing any provider tax legislation introduced.

To accomplish these goals we need your involvement. Please consider volunteering for the "Doctor on Call" CSMS initiative. We are working together to get physician representation at the legislature on various days from 11:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. and 1:00 – 5:00 p.m. to testify at public hearings and/or meet with legislators on the key issues of concern to medicine. Dr. Connair, representing the Federation of Physicians and Dentists (FPD) as well as physicians in our State provided testimony on the unequal treatment of physicians with respect to antitrust laws and their effect on health care providers. He took time from his busy, solo practice to represent the practice of medicine and advocate against the lack of antitrust enforcement against insurers. Dr. Connair has worked over the past 14 years to

educate physicians about the lawful procedures to obtain fair contracts from commercial health care insurers.

Michael Aronow, MD, provided his expertise and experience to the New York Orthopaedic Society battling podiatrists in their state on scope of practice. Dr. Aronow was instrumental in our State a few years ago with a similar scope issue and spent numerous hours in mediation/arbitration with the podiatrists and Department of Public Health to limit podiatrists seeking ankle surgery privileges and protect patients as well as the practice of orthopaedics.

Compliance Programs Reduce Risk

The Office of the Inspector General issued compliance program guidelines for solo and group practices in the Federal Register in October 2000 – but not many physicians noticed. Compliance has now become a ubiquitous word and Physicians are beginning to wonder, "What exactly is a compliance program?" This article will attempt to answer that question by presenting the OIG's guidelines and also to clarify the importance of integrating a compliance program into your orthopedic practice.

Corporate Compliance refers to your practice's pledge to operate within the statutes, rules, regulations and policies set by the government, insurance programs and payers. Current OIG guidelines for an effective compliance program specify seven key components. They are as follows:

- 1)The designation of a chief compliance officer and committee who are charged with the responsibility of operating and monitoring the compliance program within a physician group practice.
- 2)The development and distribution of written standards of conduct as well as policies and procedures which articulate a commitment to compliance across all aspects of your practice's operations such as handling patient information, billing and documentation, human resources, and business associate agreements.
- 3)The use of audits to monitor compliance and to detect, respond to and prevent identified problem areas.
- 4)The development and implementation of regular compliance education and training programs for all employees.
- 5)The creation and maintenance of a process, such as a Hotline, for employees to anonymously and without concern of retaliation, report suspected fraud or abuse.
- 6)The development of a system to promptly respond to potential or actual misconduct and to create corrective action.

Compliance Program for Your Practice

disciplinary guidelines for employees who violate federal or state laws and/or the practice's policies.

Health Care Reform, otherwise known as the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPAC), makes the establishment of a compliance program **mandatory** for all physician groups who receive federal dollars through Medicare and Medicaid. PPAC also grants significantly increased funding to several government agencies to enforce aggressive fraud and abuse prevention.

The Health Care Fraud and Abuse fund will receive \$250 million applied to a \$10 million annual budget specifically to detect payment errors and to recapture overpayments of Medicare dollars. The federal mandate coupled with the heightened surveillance of billing practices makes establishing a robust compliance program essential "preventative medicine" for physician practices, particularly those with ancillaries.

While the task of creating a compliance program appears onerous at first, the benefits to your orthopedic practice are significant. An effective compliance program will demonstrate your practice's commitment to honest, responsible corporate conduct, reduce the likelihood of an audit and can serve as a mitigating factor in the event of an audit or investigation. It will also optimize proper claims payment, streamline business operations and minimize potential financial loss to the practice through early detection of and response to billing errors.

Most importantly, an active compliance program creates a "culture of compliance" among your employees thereby protecting the integrity of the practice which you have worked diligently to create.

State of CT - CME Requirement Update

For physicians with registration periods on or after October 1, 2010, the State of Connecticut will require coursework in cultural competency.

To assist you, the AAOS has recently launched an online program, AAOS' Culturally Competent Care Program and is available at www.aaos.org/cc. This education activity is FREE to all AAOS members, including orthopaedic residents.
